President's Message

Your Executive has been very busy in the five months since we were voted into office. Some of their hard work has yet to be unveiled but is in the works. For those who use the Clubhouse or walk by, you will notice the time capsule has finally been topped off with a handsome bronze plaque. The community thanks a determined member and past Board Director, Kathy Pinder for her design and negotiating skills in completing this for us.

Watch for other improvements around the Clubhouse this spring. Now that the interior has been refurbished, Dagmar Jamieson has her focus on the landscaping. We are also resurfacing the tennis and basketball courts which should be complete for the summer tennis season. The use of the building has gone up substantially since the improvements. If you have not been by since last year, come to a social function and see for yourself.

There has been an increase in vandalism around the tennis courts the last few years, mostly of the locking system and fencing. We are assuming it is because once inside the courts, rabid tennis players forget the code and in their haste to get away from a mocking, gloating opponent, they will do anything to get off the court. To save the fragile egos, all memberships now include tennis and there is free access to the courts. If you see any signs of misuse, please call Constable Kristie Verheul,

District 2 Community Liaison Officer, Calgary Police Service 249-7701. The Community Liaison Officer should be called for other non-emergency concerns. The Police track the calls statistically and budget manpower hours accordingly. Complaints for bylaw infractions, like improper signage, should be directed to 311.

Other areas we should watch for:

1. The traffic by Mount Royal Junior High and Western Canada High School. Please be a considerate commuter and slow down in the school zone. We would like to think the offending drivers are from outside the neighbourhood in a hurry to go check out the completed time capsule but not likely.

2. Transients approaching our children and people living near and using the pathways to the Glencoe Club along Earl Grey Crescent. The street people are coming from the river area and the grasslands east of Hope Street. Alderman Madeline King and the police are aware of the problem and are working toward a solution. I encourage you to join the association. With the new website, members will be able to receive citizens' concerns about such incidents much faster than from Police sources. We can help keep crime at bay as simply as making known our presence in the community. Finally, after a clear direction from those who attended the AGM in November, you can purchase

Traffic News



Well spring has finally arrived – you know brown grass and all the remnant piles of gravel on the streets and alleyways throughout the neighborhood. So with the reality of this somewhat drab outdoor scene a more positive image is the greening of Mount Royal as the late season snow squalls turn to spring rain. With the fall planting of the traffic circles, it will be interesting to observe the appearance of these traffic calming measures as the trees and shrubs take shape with new growth. The next step in this landscaping program is to plant the small splitter islands located at each traffic circle. It is important to remember the City policy regarding the landscaping of Mount Royal traffic calming measures; the City is responsible for the planting and maintenance of the traffic circles, while the community of Mount Royal is responsible for the landscape improvements and maintenance of the splitter islands (the City construction standard for splitter islands is to hard surface these with concrete – which we did not want). Following the submission of landscape plans and with discussion with City officials we have now received approval to proceed with planting the splitter islands this spring. All the islands will be planted with densely spaced cotoneaster shrubs. Local landscape firms have been contacted to provide quotations for this work. As I mentioned in my last article, the community is responsible

to fund this enhanced landscaping work, so this is where your assistance is required. Please consider donating funds towards the greening of Mount Royal. Mark your donation “Mount Royal Landscaping” and mail or drop-off your cheque at the Mount Royal Station. Income tax receipts will be issued for donations over \$50.00. The greening of the traffic calming measures serves two very important purposes; by providing a visual barrier to the motoring public causing them to slow down as they approach the traffic circles and to soften the overall appearance of the community through the introduction of additional natural vegetation. Your support is needed and will be very appreciated as we continue to work towards our long term goals of providing safe roadways and enhancing the quality of life in our special community of Mount Royal.

Earl Grey

Quick facts:

Earl Grey is a unique elementary school run by the Calgary Board of Education located in our fantastic Mount Royal community on Hillcrest Avenue. The school grounds have huge green space and also boast a great playground for the community. There are two hundred (214) children studying from Kindergarten to Grade 6. Earl Grey's motto is "Nothing but the Best" and the Principal Judy Hehr, her administration and the School Council are committed to this. Take the opportunity to drive by the school in the mornings or late afternoons; you will see the enthusiasm of the students and the camaraderie amongst children in our community.

What makes Earl Grey unique?

This is a small school with a community feel to it supported by involved parents, committed teachers and an administration devoted to creating a positive learning environment. Some of the highlights of the school are:

- Parent volunteering - The parents are involved and work in collaboration with the school to provide an environment in which our children can excel academically.
- Small classrooms – The school has small classrooms, with approximately 20 students per class, which facilitates time per student; most teachers are supported with a classroom helper on a daily basis.
- International teacher exchange – Staff is participating in an international teacher exchange to

broaden students' minds about our world; currently, a grade 1/2 teacher from Australia.

- Healthy Council budget – The School Council provides funds to the school in support of "Nothing but the Best" Motto. Annual budget of \$45K was approved and surplus funds available.

- Continuous improvement of facilities – There is a strong focus on improving the school equipment and supplies in order to support our children's education. This includes equipment improvement like new books, computers and science supplies. Monetary and supply donations also contribute to achieving "Nothing but the Best". Last month, 50 microscope kits were donated to the school.


- Strong focus on academics: Earl Grey has a strong focus on enhanced learning and academics within a supportive and encouraging environment. Some of the specific initiatives to support this include:

- Enhanced Reading – There is a strong focus on early literacy, which means students are taught to read starting in kindergarten and reading is a large part of the curriculum.

- Excellent library – The library is the centre of the school and books are constantly being added and updated.

- Use of new technology – Teachers embrace new technology to encourage interactive learning through the use of SMARTBoards. Technology is infused into curriculum in each grade.

- Enhanced Music program – Curriculum also includes music and the school has an elaborate music room.

The school is a two-storey brick structure built in 1926. It has eight classrooms, a library, gymnasium, and two relocatable classrooms. There are two computer labs and the use of technology has been successfully integrated into our programs. There are two creative playgrounds adjacent to the building and large playing fields on either side of the school.

Our school mission is to nurture a community of intellectuals to prepare young people to make a difference in their lives and in the world.

Our school has a strong emphasis on individual student achievement. This includes competence in core subjects as well as in physical and fine arts. The School Development and Renewal Plan focuses on two student outcomes: improved achievement in writing and the development of positive virtues in all students, thereby contributing to responsible citizenship.

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“Fixing” Tom Cats

Most people know the disastrous potential for overpopulation; and subsequent animal suffering when female cats are not “fixed.” There are still people out there, however, who think males do not need to be neutered. They couldn’t be more wrong.

Male cats, aside from contributing to the cat overpopulation problem when not neutered, are running on a combination of hormones that lead to aggression, injury to self and others, wandering and marking territory. They don’t make very good additions to multi-cat households because it is in their un-neutered natures to fight, cajole and badger other felines.

Veterinarians agree that male cats should be neutered before hitting puberty to completely halt the “mating behaviours” described above. It is these behaviours which most bother humans and which make tom cats prime candidates for abandonment or for simply wandering away to seek a female and not making their way back.

There is a side to not neutering that many do not consider, however. An un-neutered cat is by nature an aggressive cat and he can do a lot of harm to other male cats as he goes through continual macho-hormonal cycles. Cats who have been neutered can also become the victims of tomcat aggression. For cats with homes who become victims of these cats, the cost of vet care can be astronomical. For cats without homes suffering the same injuries, it could be a death sentence.

Some pet owners feel that money is a barrier to neutering their pet. In Calgary, several humane societies have come together to offer the SNAP program (Spay/Neuter Assistance Program) to citizens who might not otherwise afford the veterinary bills associated with fixing their pets. Any local animal rescue organization can provide information on SNAP.

Spaying is definitely an answer to pet overpopulation□so too is neutering. The operation is not cruel and it does not rob a cat of natural experiences. Neutering better affords an animal peace, calm, and happiness.

The MEOW Foundation is a no-kill cat rescue charity operating in the Calgary area. MEOW has helped thousands of homeless cats since 2000.

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Report from Dave Taylor MLA

The Legislature is back in session and I am excited to be back there and speaking out on your behalf. There is much work to be done on a whole range of issues and it has been great to be getting so much feedback from the constituents of Calgary Currie. Alberta faces some significant challenges, but Calgarians like to focus on solutions and there are real opportunities to move forward.

Affordable housing remains a critical issue for many of you. I have spent a considerable amount of time on this issue and we've identified solutions. The most important thing to do now is to put them into action. I will continue to take a lead role in making sure the Province of Alberta does this.

I will continue to work on behalf of all Calgarians to make sure the Province fully funds the new South Calgary Hospital this city needs. The dollars are there. The need is clear. It's time to start construction. But we also need more people to staff a new hospital with state-of-the-art technology. We need to expand the capacities of Mount Royal, the U of C, SAIT and Bow Valley College to educate and graduate more doctors, nurses, lab and diagnostic technicians, hospital support staff, public and community health workers. Our need is clear. It's time to stop the foot-dragging.

Forty Calgary communities need new schools, but mature neighborhoods like the communities of Calgary Currie need to preserve, protect, and repair the schools they still have. Neighborhood schools help make for vibrant, sustainable communities and liveable cities. So does neighborhood preservation. Densification without destruction involves protecting our heritage buildings and historic neighbourhoods. Investments in public transit should continue so people don't always have to drive. It's good for the environment – and for our stress level. Preserving our parks and natural

spaces is key to any successful big city. So are strong families and they need quality, available child care.

I am always happy to hear your feedback and to go to bat for you to ensure that we can get things done. Our office is open Monday to Friday from 9:00 am – 4:30 pm. As your MLA, my job is to facilitate solutions. That works best when we all work together.
